Partners For Kids Expanding to the Dayton Region

Partners For Kids is expanding to the west central region of Ohio in partnership with Dayton Children's Hospital and in coordination with CareSource. In this new collaboration, Partners For Kids will help coordinate the delivery of health services for 94,000 children enrolled with CareSource in Auglaize, Champaign, Clark, Darke, Greene, Mercer, Miami, Montgomery, Preble and Shelby counties. In addition, Partners For Kids is adding responsibility for CareSource members in Allen, Hardin and Richland counties to the south central and southeast regions that currently manages. Primary Care Proof Forms

Incentive payments for the 2019 true up calculation will be included in the checks distributed to primary care practices in August. Primary care providers will receive a non-compliant patient list that includes those patients who were attributed to your practice in 2019 but did not meet the 2019 incentive measures based on available claims data. In the event there are patients included on the non-compliant patient list who received services in 2019, practices may submit proof forms to receive credit for these patients.

As an enhancement to the proof form process, cover sheets for each patient are no longer required. Instead, the non-compliant patient lists will include blanks in which you can write the date of service for the patients that were seen. Your patient lists will take the place of the cover sheets. Practices should submit the non-compliant patient lists with appropriate documentation (either an EOP or HCFA) via email (PFKProRelations@NationwideChildrens.org) or secure fax at (614) 355-3185. Proof forms will be accepted until close of business on **November 1, 2020**. Payments for all validated proof forms will be included in the November incentive check.

Primary Care Network Requirement

Credentialed primary care providers have a few months left this year to fulfill their 2020 Network Requirement. Each provider must participate in at least one of the categories listed below by December 31, 2020, to ensure that they are eligible for 2020 incentive bonuses:

- Participation on a Partners For Kids Board or Committee (Credentials, Provider Incentive Program or Provider Leadership Committee)
- Participation in a Partners For Kids-sponsored Quality Improvement Project (projects include MOC Credit)
- Partner with the Patient Outreach Team
- One televisit with a Partners for Kids Pharmacist
- One televisit with the Partners for Kids Medical Director
- One televisit with a Partners for Kids Provider Relations Specialist
- Attend any one of four Partners for Kids Quarterly Webinar (includes CME Credit)
- Attendance at one of Partners For Kids COVID-19 or Telehealth webinars
- Attendance at a Nationwide Children's Behavioral Health webinar (includes CME Credit)
- Attendance at a Coding Seminar hosted by Children's Practicing Pediatricians/Nationwide Children's Hospital/Partners For Kids (Includes CME Credit)

To date, over 82% of the eligible providers have completed their requirements utilizing these opportunities. If you have questions regarding the Network Requirement, please contact

Drive-Thru Immunization Clinic Recommendations

Completion rates of the childhood vaccine series have decreased as a result of the COVID-19 stay-at-home order. It is more important than ever to protect your patients against influenza and all immunization-preventable diseases. To reduce the risk of infection transmission, your practice might consider conducting a drive-thru immunization clinic for both flu shots and any catch-up vaccines your patients need. Now is the time to start planning drive-thru clinics to align with flu shot administration beginning in September. Helpful tips to assist you in planning and running your drive-thru immunization clinics include:

1. Identify a project champion at your practice to lead this offering
2. Obtain appropriate licenses and permissions from building/parking lot management or city as needed
3. Design a traffic flow pattern that maximizes the safety of families/patients (staying in car, buckled into seats) and clinic staff
4. Schedule the clinic during times when the parking lot is less busy (e.g., weekends or evenings) and when clinic staff are available
5. Consider how patients should schedule an appointment, complete pre-visit paperwork (e.g., COVID-19 screening and immunization consent forms), and provide insurance or payment information

6. Review what materials are needed (e.g., all supplies for immunizing and emergency kit) and ensure everything is set up in a weather-proof manner (e.g., tents, temperature monitored coolers, sharps containers out of reach)

New Ohio Department of Medicaid Telehealth Rule

The Ohio Department of Medicaid (ODM) has adopted a [new emergency rule](#) 5160-1-18 effective July 17, 2020, that expands upon the initial emergency rule and extends the temporary waiver for telehealth through November 2020. Reimbursement for providers will remain at parity with the rates for in-person visits. Telehealth reimbursement for common procedure codes is captured in an extensive [listing](#). All providers should regularly refer to the Ohio Department of Medicaid (ODM) [fee schedule and rates](#) for frequent updates. Behavioral health telehealth services rendered by Ohio-MHAS certified providers are found on the ODM [website](#).

ODM Suspends Episodes of Care Program

ODM has determined that disruptions in healthcare service demand and provision prevent accurate reporting under the Episodes of Care Program. Therefore, ODM will neither conduct reporting nor assess incentive

payments for the 2020 and 2021 calendar years. Providers are still responsible for prior years' performance. ODM intends to restart the program in 2022.

Did You Know? Benefits of Provider Capacity with all 5 Medicaid plans

Partners For Kids providers are par with all five Medicaid managed care plans unless providers have opted out of a plan. Maintaining capacity with all Medicaid managed care plans is especially important during COVID-19. The pandemic has resulted in job loss for some parents resulting to increases in managed Medicaid enrollment. Providers who participate with all managed Medicaid plans decrease the likelihood of disruptions with reimbursement. Each provider may hold a minimum capacity of 50 and a maximum capacity of 2,000 for each of the Medicaid managed care plans. If you prefer to make revisions, capacity forms may be found [here](#).
